Twelve citizens participated


Aerial photography, parcel base maps, proposed Highway-to-Highway corridor, zoning maps, background material on Form Based Codes, draft Fairview Community Plan

Two groups of six each worked to produce independent visions of the corridor.

Presentation #1

Allen Kemplen, AICP - Neighborhood Plan

Slides were presented detailing historical Fairview, past planning efforts, key community themes and important economic opportunities.



Presentation #2

Allen Kemplen, AICP - Form Based Code

Slides were presented explaining the difference between current Title 21 and a new approach for creating a Sense of Place for Fairview with a focus on restoring the neighborhood Main Street. He also described what materials were available to the groups, their mission and what type of product each group should deliver by the end of their collective effort.

Presentation #3

Pat Krochina, AIA - Highway-to-Highway

A discussion from a member of the formal Citizens Advisory Committee and a business owner (Nvision) along Gambell Street about the need for the large project. He explained how City and State technical staff have proven the need for the Highway-to-Highway project. Pat also described why it was in the best interests of Fairview stakeholders to develop a positive vision for the corridor.

Workshop Report

Description of Alternatives: Both groups felt that the Sports Complex represented an important economic anchor in the neighborhood. However, Gambell Street did not have the appropriate businesses or pedestrian friendly streetscape to capture some of the disposable income of those attending events at the sports facilities. It was felt that this situation could be changed by: 1) Constructing a new, mixed-use parking structure south of 15th Avenue between Gambell and Ingra with an elevated pedestrian walkway over to the Sullivan Arena area. 2) Converting Gambell Street from a four-lane, one-way street to a two-lane, two-way street with widened sidewalks and on-street parking 3) Developing the cover above a proposed sunken freeway with mixed-use, commercial/office to provide a focus area for economic growth.

Both Groups also felt that a stronger linkage should be made with the Downtown area so that tourists would find it a pleasurable experience to walk/bike east to Gambell, south to Chester Creek Greenbelt, west to Coastal Trail and north to downtown hotels. Such an positive experience requires shifting the character of land use from an auto-orientation to a pedestrian orientation. This requires changing Title 21 land use code regulations to resemble the Central Business District.
