

DOWNTOWN UPDATE

THE GROUND HAS BEEN BROKEN

The official groundbreaking for the new Civic & Convention Center took place on Monday, April 17, 2006. About 50 people attended the groundbreaking ceremony, including Mayor Mark Begich, developers Mark Pfeffer and Jim Rubini, ACCCY co-chairs Wilson Hughes, Tennys Owens and Chris Swalling, and ACVB President Bruce Bustamante.

The new **Convention Center** builds on one of Anchorage's greatest strengths – the visitor industry – which last year **attracted more than 800,000 visitors** who **contributed over \$1 billion** to the economy.

The project is expected to **generate about 1,300 construction jobs** during its three years of construction and **1,900 new direct and indirect jobs** once its opens in Fall 2008.

WHAT ABOUT STREET CLOSURES?

The streets that are closed now – 7th Avenue between F and G Streets, F Street between 7th and 8th Avenues, part of G Street between 7th and 8th Avenues – will remain closed throughout the construction of the Convention Center with one exception:

On or about August 1, they will reopen one northbound lane on F Street between 7th and 8th Avenues, adjacent to the Atwood Building. In addition, the barricades on G Street between 7th and 8th Avenues will be pushed back allowing one southbound lane on G Street and one lane of on-street parking adjacent to the ConocoPhillips building.

SPEAKING OF PARKING...

For businesses located at or near the site of the new Convention Center, parking is a huge concern. Several businesses voiced those concerns at a meeting on Monday morning with parties involved in the construction of the new Convention Center, including RISE Alaska, RIM Architects, Neeser Construction and the Municipality.

Workers from the Atwood Building now will use the JC Penney's parking garage and the parking lot just to the north of the Atwood Building on 7th Avenue between E & F Streets. The good news is that parking lot will be open to the public after 5:00pm on weekdays and all day on weekends. However, be aware that they will tow non-Atwood vehicles that park in that lot during business hours, so make sure you tell your customers.

In the near future, some of the on-street parking spots that are currently closed on F Street between 6th and 7th Avenues will likely be reopened. The Traffic Department and the Parking Authority are still working on which spots to reopen. And the single loading zone currently at the corner of F Street and 7th Avenue (in front of Dark Horse Coffee) will be expanded to accommodate more than one vehicle.
