Special Assistant to the Mayor: George Martinez:

Community Concerns/Community Activities Report(s): Stu Grenier discussed a plant that is abrasive to the environment and he showed pictures and discussed how it is growing all over Anchorage. A lady spoke and I could not hear anything she said. Another person was speaking and I could not hear anything they are saying.

Business:

1. Bus Barn land swap discussion in regards to relocation to property behind McDonalds / Totem Theater off Muldoon: Ms. Robin Ward and Dowl Engineers presenting: Mr. Tim Potter was doing the presentation...He is extremely hard to hear. It sounds like he is describing the site and the location. All I can hear from Mr. Potter is mumbling...Cathy came to ask question, is this a done deal? I believe Mr. Potter is saying this is not a done deal. Ms. Swanson, she lives in the Scenic Foothills Community Council, they are affected and they are not happy that there would be diesel fuel flames into the homes of the people. A gentlemen said that he did not want to breathe the diesel fumes in the area. It was also mentioned that this was a classified wetlands area and that EPA might need to be involved. Stu Grenier said that he did not support this. He said he will come up with a motion later. Tracy Odom did not like the location and asked if there are other locations to put the Bus Barn?

Stu Grenier set a motion of: We the NECC does not support the Bus Barn going into the proposed location. A Second by John Ziv.

Discussion: Carla wanted a decision from SFCC before the NECC makes a decision. The SFCC President would like us to oppose the Bus Barn.

2. Library Update: Mr. Jim Curran Presenting. They are located in the Northeast Community Center. Mr. Curran went over many programs that the library. The library was asked to propose cuts to the library.
3. Move to Amend is requesting a consideration for their resolution: Ms. Beverly Churchill presenting. They want to have a constitutional amendment to remove corporate donors. Stu Grenier seconds the motion.

Be it resolved, the People of the Northeast Community Council call for amending the United States Constitution to establish that:

1. Only human beings are entitled to constitutional rights, and
2. Money is not speech, and therefore regulating political contributions and spending is not equivalent to limiting political speech.

4. Safety Perimeter Resolution: Ms. Tasha Hotch presenting: She found out that there were people that lived closed to schools that were sex offenders. Stu Grenier made motion for this resolution. Genevieve mentioned that if you draw a circle, there will not be many places that many people would not be able to get a place. It was very hard to hear people as they did not use the microphone.

WHEREAS, The State of Alaska maintains a database of registered Sex Offenders.

WHEREAS, Residency restrictions for sex offenders that prohibit offenders from residing within a certain perimeter from schools, day care centers, parks and other locations frequented by children is a restriction that municipalities, states and tribes can make. This has been exercised by 21 other states imposing residency restrictions up to 2,000 feet.

WHEREAS, A search of the Alaska Sex Offender Registry will demonstrate that those registered closest to our schools (within 1,000 feet), have been convicted of: sexual assault, sexual abuse of a minor 3, possession of child pornography, and sexual abuse of a minor 2. Which concludes that without a restriction those offenders who may be most tempted by children live within what should be a safety perimeter.

WHEREAS, The community has already made a stance on keeping children safe by imposing restrictions on alcohol and marijuana establishments and the permitted distance from schools.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Municipality of Anchorage take steps toward imposing a 2,000 foot Sex Offender residency restriction perimeter for Schools, and Municipal recreation centers and defining those locations at the property line, and not the front door, this will allow us to capture the property area.

THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that our State Legislature takes steps toward legislation that would impose a 2,000 foot Sex Offender residency restriction perimeter for Schools and Municipal Recreation Centers as part of a Sex Offenders Probation.

5. Creekside Ball Parks being changed to a dog park: Ms. Carla McConnell presenting. Second by Bob Ruepke.

WHEREAS, Anchorage Parks provide recreation for many different users, and

WHEREAS, Anchorage Parks and Recreation has created ball fields within in our parks for the enjoyment of those that play team sports whether organized or impromptu, and

WHEREAS, Anchorage Parks and Recreation has begun to permit and/or allow individuals to have dogs on the ball fields, and

WHEREAS, ball field users, including community members as well as local youth and adult sports organizations must now deal with feces and urine deposited by dogs on the fields, and

AND WHEREAS, the Municipality has provided dedicated dog parks for the Anchorage community.

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Northeast Community Council respectfully requests that the Municipality of Anchorage Parks and Recreation discourage the presence of dogs on municipal ball fields located in the NECC area and discontinue permitting groups from using ball fields for dog training purposes or any other purpose. Although the NECC can only provide a position for our community, we suggest that Parks and Recreation implement this city wide.
