A Resolution regarding North A

A Resolution regarding North Access to the University-Medical (U-Med) District

Whereas, a "North Access to U-Med District" road is scheduled to be built in the next eleven years1; and

Whereas, north and northeast UAA land includes wetlands and wildlife habitat that should be protected; and

Whereas, the 2011 Rogers Park Community Council annual survey respondents overwhelmingly supported the preservation of the trails and open space on UAA and APU lands²; and

Whereas, the 2009 UAA Master Plan recommends that development of the north and northeast extremities of the campus should be postponed "...until re-development of previously disturbed land has been exhausted....By this means, the largest natural areas of the campus will be reserved for recreation and as viable wildlife habitats"; and

Whereas, a north access road to the U-Med district would disrupt campus natural areas and trails;

Whereas, a north access road to the U-Med district would disrupt east/west traffic on Northern Lights; and

Whereas, a north access road to the U-Med district would cause unacceptable traffic congestion and safety hazards for East High School students, staff, and parents; and

Whereas, the northeast area of Anchorage has access to quality emergency medical services at Alaska Regional Hospital; and

Whereas, a north access road to the U-Med district would result in small improvements in travel times to and from the northeast*; and

Whereas, the recent DOWL/HKM engineering study of north access alternatives did not evaluate perimeter road and intersection upgrades that would improve U-Med district access without compromising natural areas; and

Whereas, public transportation enhancements to this region could alleviate some traffic issues;

Therefore be it resolved that Rogers Park Community Council

- Does not support a north access road to the U-Med district from Northern Lights east of UAA Drive, and
- Recommends that Project No. 125 of the PRD of the 2035 MTP should be deleted from the MTP or moved to the "long-term" (2024-2035) or "illustrative" (beyond 2035) categories.

^{*} According to the September 2011 "Reconnaissance Study Report" on north access to the U-MED district, the "Bragaw Extension" would reduce travel time for a vehicle trying to get to the District from Northern Lights and Boniface at the "peak hour" in the morning by 20 seconds, and by 1 minute and 40 seconds for a vehicle trying to get to Northern Lights and Boniface from the District at the worst time of day in the afternoon or evening.



¹ This is Project No. 125 of the 2035 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP), Public Review Draft (PRD). It is in the "short-term" group of proposed projects; i.e., proposed to be completed between 2012 and 2023.

² There were 118 respondents to the 2011 RPCC annual survey, Pertinent results:

 ^{76%} of respondents feel that is very important that open space and trails on UAA and APU campus land be preserved as much as possible. 19% feel this is somewhat important. 5% stated that it was unimportant.

o 52% % of respondents use the campus trails and open space more than once per week, 16% use the trails once per week, 15% use the trails once per month, and 17% hardly ever use the trails.
