**A RESOLUTION OF THE ROGERS PARK COMMUNITY COUNCIL
IN SUPPORT OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF ANCHORAGE PROVIDING AN INDEPENDENT
TRANSPARENT PUBLIC HEALTH REVIEW OF SCHOOL DISTRICT PLANS TO RECONVENE
STUDENTS, TEACHERS AND STAFF IN CLOSE CONTACT WITHIN ANCHORAGE SCHOOLS WHILE
ANCHORAGE IS EXPERIENCING A PANDEMIC**

WHEREAS, the State of Alaska Constitution, drafted, passed and ratified with historic knowledge of pandemics, provides that one of the responsibilities of State Government is to provide for the public health

WHEREAS, State Statutes provide that home rule municipalities have the authority to regulate matters of public health.

WHEREAS, the Municipality of Anchorage, under its home rule authority, has the authority and responsibility to act on behalf of the people in its community to provide regulation and advice to protect the public health, a profound and solemn responsibility during a pandemic

WHEREAS, current conditions reported by the State of Alaska indicate COVID-19 incidence is on the order of 5 times the "red zone" high public health risk threshold that remains a feature on the Municipality dashboard for the COVID-19 pandemic:

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- 1) MOA RED HIGH PUBLIC HEALTH RISK THRESHOLD
 - a) 7-day moving average, new cases, 10 per 100,000 (MOA COVID Tracking Web Site)
- 2) Current Conditions
 - a) 14-day moving average, new cases, 72.2 per 100,000 (November 9, Table 2c)

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 test positivity rate for Anchorage reported by the State of Alaska is roughly 8.5% (November 9, Table 5), on the order of 1.7 times the public health threshold of 5% that has been cited by the WHO as a baseline indicator of adequate testing,

WHEREAS, communities with public education and public health challenges similar to Anchorage, who were facing high and rising incidence as well as positivity rates that were lower than those currently being experienced in Anchorage, have retreated from reconvening students, teachers and staff in close contact within their schools, e.g.,

- 1) Boston Mayor announces delays in Boston School District reopening plans as testing positivity rate (diverse student body with roughly 54,000 students) goes above 5% to 5.7%¹
- 2) Google search of covid-19 related school closures reveals a large and growing number both in Alaska (Y-K Delta, Mat-Su, Kenai Peninsula) and across the U.S. as community spread surges

WHEREAS, in states that have reopened schools, e.g. Arkansas, recent data indicates that over 2,000 public school teachers have tested positive for COVID and at least six have died [New York Times School Briefing, Monday, November 2, 2020],

WHEREAS, recent independent professional public health advice, (see The Lancet COVID-19 Commission Statement, Volume 396, Number 10257, pages 1045-1128, October 10-16, 2020), has concluded:

Opening schools when the epidemic in an area is not under control is inadvisable; as it is likely to be a short-lived policy, followed by rapid closure of facilities if many children and teachers are quickly infected. Teachers might also refuse to work unless assured of workplace safety. [paragraph 40]

WHEREAS, independent professional public health risk assessment thresholds that include consideration of when it is prudent to reconvene students, teachers and staff in close contact within local schools are well below current conditions faced by Anchorage,

WHEREAS, in summary it appears that the school district proposal to reconvene its staff (ASD typically issues on the order of 9,000 W-2s a year not including contractors) back inside of Municipal buildings in order to serve an initial population of SPED and preK – 2nd grade followed by all elementary grades in January will substantially raise the number of close contacts in our community by thousands while the community spread is substantially above independent professional public health risk thresholds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT the Rogers Park Community Council supports the Municipality of Anchorage exercising its authority to regulate *and advise* on public health matters to ensure that all employers, including one of the largest employers in the State of Alaska, the Anchorage School District, are strongly encouraged to meet or exceed all prudent public health guidance while under the daunting emergency circumstances of the COVID-19 pandemic, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Rogers Park Community Council strongly encourages the Municipality to disclose its independent, professional public health assessment and advice regarding ASD’s plans to help illuminate the public health risks and mitigation strategies and provide the community with confidence that public health risk thresholds and associated public health guidance provided by the Municipal Health Department are prudent, professional, science-based, and reflect the current outlook for the COVID-19 pandemic in Anchorage.

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NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Rogers Park Community Council strongly encourages the Municipality to work directly with ASD, employers, childcare providers and the community in a collaborative process to communicate prioritizing the return to in person learning for our students.
