Education Infrastructure Passed by Legislature, Voters

This month, voters agreed by 59% to pass Proposition B, a bond package of \$379.2 million for the construction of educational buildings, creating jobs and building infrastructure across the state. The bond package was the largest in Alaska history to gain voter approval, and was secured at an all-time low interest rate. fund, and there is no direct impact on property taxes for residents of Alaska.



Most importantly, however, is the impact these projects will have on the state's economy, growth, and future.

Twelve projects spanning the state will infuse over 6,400 jobs, while creating sustainable jobs in facilities across the state. The new or improved facilities in Fairbanks,

Alakunuk, Mat-Su, Kenai, Anchorage, Kipnuk,

Kwigillingok, Kodiak, Sitka, Juneau, and Klawock are intended to prevent the "brain drain" of young Alaskans from leaving the state for higher education.

In Anchorage, UAA will begin construction of a new 130,000 ft. sports facility, which includes auxiliary gymnasiums, fitness and training areas, locker rooms, and office space, and would provide a mid-sized seating arena of 5,600. This project alone is expected to generate over 300-350 jobs during a two year construction phase, as approximately \$70 million in total labor income. This facility is expected to be a revenue generator. A conservative estimate of economic impact ranges from \$3.0-5.0 million per year by hosting visitors from outside of Anchorage. The project provides space for health and wellness education, as well as ample room for sporting events relevant to the growing student population and faculty. An interesting note about this building will be an effort to welcome non-profit and community groups with a higher quality option.



The new UAA Community Facility will work in tandem with the existing Wells Fargo Sports Complex to serve both campus and community needs.

The University of Fairbanks received the largest portion of the bond, \$88 million, for the renovation and addition to the Life Sciences Classroom and Lab Facilities. Currently, students in this area attend classes in temporary modular buildings located outside the standing structure. The new facility additions will relieve space restrictions and support UAF's Biology and Wildlife Departments.

By investing in our state's educational growth and future, we are investing in Alaska. These projects around the state are sure to be influential on generations of Alaskans.
