
Did you know?

In their lifetime, a high school graduate will earn \$400,000 more on average than a dropout

Dropouts are twice as likely to commit crimes and account for more than 61% of the prison population

Dropouts are twice as likely to live in poverty

The current one-time high school graduation rate in Anchorage is 72 percent. That means roughly one in four students isn't graduating on time, facing greater odds of unemployment, poverty and criminal behavior.



Convened by the United Way of Anchorage, <u>Anchorage United</u> <u>for Youth (AUY)</u> is a growing collaboration of nonprofit, <u>public</u> <u>and private partners</u> and hundreds of community-minded Alaskans just like you, united in their efforts to help our youth succeed.
