Alaska's Constitution is unique in its strength and clarity when defending some of the principles Alaskans cherish most.

- <u>Section 1.5:</u> Freedom of Speech. "Every person may freely speak, write, and publish on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right."
- <u>Section 1.22</u>: **The Right of Privacy.** "The right of the people to privacy is recognized and shall not be infringed."
- <u>Section 8.1</u>: **Statement of Policy.** "It is the policy of the State to encourage the settlement of its land and the development of its resources by making them available for maximum use consistent with the public interest."

These sections highlight Alaska's constitutional commitment to upholding the values of the people. We protect free speech, we respect each other's privacy, and we understand that as Alaskans, we all share ownership of Alaska's tremendous resources. These are some of the values our bi-partisan founders had the foresight to include in our Constitution, and their work should not be undone.

Amending the Alaska Constitution should be something we do only under extreme circumstances. Should we find it necessary, we can vote for changes one at a time through a ballot initiative rather than opening up the entire Constitution for a full scale makeover.

During the course of this election season I, like you, have been inundated with political advertisements. Recent changes to campaign finance laws following the <u>Citizens United v. FEC</u> decision by the Supreme Court have opened the floodgates for outside money to pour into our democratic process. The simple truth is that this money could ultimately be used to influence the outcome of a Constitutional Convention. Alaskans, not outsiders, should be calling the shots when it comes to our constitution and that's why I think a Constitutional Convention is ill advised.

I urge you to take some time <u>and read about the fascinating and visionary minds</u> that crafted the Alaska Constitution. Their vision for Alaska has endured thus far and I hope to continue serving under their guidance and leadership.
