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### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE COUNCIL'S APRIL MEETING

Meeting called to order by presiding offi- **Department:** cer Sharon Chamard at 7:10 pm.

The agenda was amended to allow two guests to speak for two minutes each prior to the regular agenda items. Hugh Wade from the Mountain View Community Council thanked Allen Kemplen for his recent guidance on issues that neighborhood is dealing with. Lydia Hayward from the Anchorage Women's Commission gave a brief description of the goals of the organization.

#### Secretary's Report, Sharon Chamard:

Due to communication and technical problems, there were no copies of the March general membership meeting minutes available. At the May meeting, the membership can vote to approve both the March and the April minutes.

Sgt. Cindi Stanton, Anchorage Police

No one from the community has contacted Sgt. Stanton in the last month regarding issues. The gang unit has been making contact with suspected gang members, and confiscating lots of guns and body armor. #### Allan Tesche, Anchorage Assembly:

Downtown will change soon because of the convention center construction, and will be a mess for the next couple of years. Work will also start on the E Street Corridor project and the museum expansion.

On the Assembly, there was a dustup concerning the liquor license for Calypso's Martini Bar at 637 A. Street. It turns out this is next to a Russian Orthodox Church, and there was lots of opposition from priests. The bar probably won't open because of a law prohibiting a liquor establishment from being within 200 feet of a religious meeting area. There continues to be debate about the sign ordinance and pole signs, and people are upset about the 92 feet high transmission towers recently installed by Chugach Electric along Northern Lights. On Tuesday the Assembly will be taking up the Assisted Living ordinance again. Allan praised the Neighborhood Plan and congratulated Allen Kemplen and the rest of the Neighborhood Plan Committee for their hard work.

Questions and comments from the membership concerned recent gun ordinances and the state law prohibiting bars within 200 feet of churches.

#### Doe Anderson, Northwest Parks District

The Parks Bond was not supported by the electorate in the recent municipal election. This will led to a set back on some projects. The advisory board for the Northwest Parks District will be going on a tour of the area parks to identify those that need - Rebuilding unity help the most. The Parks and Recreation

Department is moving to "zoned gardening," wherein staff will be assigned to take care of the parks within a certain area. The parks in Fairview are getting better, but there are a few areas with severe decay. Last summer, there was great participation from Fairview residents on parks projects. The three neighborhood paintings in the multi-purpose room at the Rec. Ctr. are going to be restored and perhaps covered with plexiglass.

### Amy Danzl, Fairview Recreation Cen-

There will be classes offered in the computer lab and on personal finances. Over the Spring Break, 35 children attended the program, though not many were from Fairview.

Allen Kemplen asked who is responsible for the Fairview gateway sign on 15th and Orca, as some of the lights are burnt out. Doe said Park Maintenance is responsible for the sidewalk areas along 15th, Street Maintenance looks after the median, and lights are replaced by Facilities Maintenance.

#### Fairview Neighborhood Plan

Allen Kemplen began by showing the FVCC flyer he received in the mail that day which advertises the Fairview Neighborhood Plan process and asks for public participation at the April, May, and June general membership meetings and the workshop on May 13th at the Senior Center. He then presented the first three chapters of the draft Neighborhood Plan, and then led an hour-long discussion on the action items people would like to see in the plan. The following ideas were generated:

#### Committee and Community Reports:

#### **Education Committee, Dale Myhill**

The committee met on March 21<sup>st</sup> and Dale reported briefly on what occurred there. The School Board Candidate Forum went very well, with seven of eight candidates attending. The Fairview Community Barbecue will be on June 1<sup>st</sup> from 5-7 pm at the Parkview Manor (810 Karluk St.). If anyone wants to receive the minutes of the Education Committee meetings, they can leave their e-mail addresses with Dale or look on the FVCC website.

#### **Beautification, Harry Deuber**

The Spring Clean-up is on the first Saturday in May. Waste Management will not be donating dumpsters this year. Each one will cost \$125, but the muni will waive the dump fee. Money for the dumpsters will come from out of Beautification Committee funds. Other committee activities, such as the plant sale and diverter planting, will be starting very soon. The committee will be working closely with Parks and Recreation. The calendar of activities is on the FVCC website. Volunteers are needed for all activities.

#### **Recreation Center, Dave Brossard**

The facility is still being painted. It is taking a while because there is only one painter, but there has been much progress already. The Center will be closed from May 30<sup>th</sup> to June 5<sup>th</sup> for floor maintenance. Victims of the fire at King's Court were able to use the Center as a shelter. The Muni Contracting Office has some money to spend this year on the Rec. Center.

## **Public Safety Committee, Sharon Chamard**

At the March Public Safety Committee meeting there was discussion about behavior problems among kids at the Recreation Center and possible approaches to handle the situation. Sharon is still trying to find someone who might be interested in being involved with the Brother Francis Shelter. The committee discussed possible content for the new Fairview Community Council website. Things have been quiet on community patrol, although one property is under surveillance, and another landlord, despite evicting some drug dealers, still has work to do. Sharon and Lee put together a letter to Les Gara asking for \$5,000 for the patrol. His staff got back to us and asked us to be more specific with a list and costs of items and to prioritize the list. Sharon attended a meeting on April 4<sup>th</sup> regarding the Anchorage Community Assessment Project. This involves a citywide survey effort on June 3<sup>rd</sup>; it is very likely there will be people in Fairview that day surveying residents on a number of community indicators. There will be a design workshop on Fairbanks Park on Saturday, April 15<sup>th</sup> from 10 am to noon at the Fairview Recreation Center.

#### Community Comments and Concerns:

**Celeste Benson** would like a regular agenda item for a report from the Anchorage Senior Center. The Senior Center will be having an Open House on Wednesday, May 17<sup>th</sup> from 10 AM to 6 PM.

**Regina Manteufel** commented on the activities of the Red Cross in relation to the victims of the King's Court Fire. She was angry because the Red Cross refused her offer of a clothing donation, and asked

that the FVCC send a letter of complaint to the Red Cross. Allen Kemplen said the matter merits further consideration, and that perhaps the Red Cross should be invited to the May general membership meeting to account for its actions.

Ron Alleva mentioned two pieces of legislation concerning firearms that are pending in Juneau and with the Assembly. He moved that the council write a letter to Senator Johnny Ellis and Representative Les Gara voicing our opposition to concealed gun laws that allow adults to bring firearms onto school property. This motion carried. He then made another motion that the council write a letter to Assemblyman Allan Tesche and Mayor Mark Begich opposing the municipal ordinance that would allow guns seized or confiscated by the municipality to be auctioned directly to the public. This motion carried.

#### Old Business:

At last month's meeting, Dan Loring requested that the FVCC make a \$100 donation to the Student Council at Fairview Elementary School. A motion was introduced to this effect and passed unanimously.
