Guests & Presentations:

Robin Alessi, Kodiak Café

This was a presentation to advise the council of plans to apply for a change in the conditional use for the liquor license at the Kodiak Café from a Beer and Wine license to a full license. The main reason for this is to accommodate a new dinner menu. The facility will continue to be non-smoking. It will be open until 2 am on weekdays and 2:30 am on Friday and Saturday nights. No neighbors have voiced any objec-

Ms. Alessi reported that the Downtown Community Council has been presented with the plan, and will vote on the change to the conditional use at a special Executive meeting. There was general support for the change in the conditional us; the Presiding Office said she would entertain a sense-of-the-body motion of support, but no member made such a motion.

Doe Anderson, Northwest Parks District Manager:

There will be about 20 youths in Fairview July 11th and 13th to work in the parks on Clean and Green activities-cleaning-painting-and so on. Community volunteers are needed on these days as well. Allen Kemplen asked about the graffiti on the shelter at Fairview Park. It need to be repainted completely.

Dave Lundeby, George Janssen, and Elise **Huggins, Merrill Field:**

This was a presentation regarding the landscaping plan for the two new hangers soon to be constructed in the general area of the 1400 block of Orca Street. The four-plex that was there has been relocated. The Urban Design Commission will review the plan on July 21st. Elise Huggins from Earthscape showed renderings of the proposed landscaping that will serve as a visual buffer between the hangers and the residential property on the west side of Orca Street. There was discussion about the color selection for the hangers. The FVCC ad hoc committee had chosen white, but the builder has already chosen a more neutral beige color. Allen Kemplen suggested that the committee have a say in color selection. The buildings will be a maximum of 16 feet high. Maintenance of the new landscaping was also briefly discussed/

Allen Kemplen moved, seconded by Claris Syren, that the FVCC support the landscaping design as presented for the sought side hanger (Lot 4-A). There was no discussion and the motion passed unanimously on a voice vote.

Allen Kemplen suggested that the presenters return to the FVCC Executive Board with samples of the possible building colors. There was agreement on the idea.

Allen Kemplen, Fairview Neighborhood Plan:

Progress is being made on the NHP. The first three chapters can be viewed on the FVCC website (http://www.communitycouncils.org).

Work is in progress on chapters 4 through 6. cial parcel data will be incorporated into the plan. The NHP Committee includes an architect who will illustrate some future design ideas. Winter City concepts, traffic issues, an economic plan, and an overlay zone will be discussed and included in the plan. Some more specific issues and recommendations include:

- The Highway To Highway Connection (The Fairview Parkway)-include green spaces above and alongside the freeway
- West Fairview-more urban/dense
- Gambell Street-"Main Street" for Fairview with two-way traffic
- Merrill Field impacts-flight patterns, noise, accidents
- Pedestrian Safety-provide pedestrian and bicycle grid, Creek-to-Creek connections, and a greenbelt around the urban core
- Karluk Street and the Fairview Parkway will have trails linking to downtown
- Grid to link east/west and north/south connections
- Sports Entertainment District in conjunction with a Sports Complex and Neighborhood Center.

Katsumi Kenaston asked about an arts and market district for Fairview. Allen said this would not be a recommendation in the plan. because both Downtown and Mountain View are developing these sorts of districts. General discussion about a truck route through Fairview focused on the idea of moving forward with the Fairview Parkway Connection to funnel truck traffic on the freeway and out of Fairview and Downtown.

Community & Committee Reports:

Beautification, Harry Deuber

The Flower Patrol's Plant Sale on May 27th was successful and raised about \$1,200. On June 6th, about 1,500 plants were planted in the diverters. "Thank you to the people who donated money for the diverters."

Education, Dale Myhill

The Community BBQ on June 1st at Parkview Manor was a big success. The committee met on May 16th. Issues discussed included a lack of communications among groups (parents, business, community, etc) and an action plan. An ad hoc committee will be formed in July.

Fairview Elementary PTA, Dan Loring

There has been resistance from the school officials about being included. Meetings of the PTA have not been encouraged. Allen Kemplen suggested that Dan write a council resolution regarding concerns with the school over the lack of cooperation with the PTA. The new PTA President is Dorothy Reddick, and Daretha Tolbert is the vice-president.

Fairview Recreation Center, Dave Brossard

Renovations are almost complete and the center will be reopened soon. A container gardening class for ages 12 and older is being planned. At the same times as these classes, there will be games in the gym for younger children. The Volunteen Program for those aged 15-18 will be run at the Spenard Rec Center. The Food Bank of Alaska has set up a mobile food bank at the Fairview Rec Center every second Saturday of the month.

Public Safety, Sharon Chamard

At the last meeting of the committee, the two main topics discussed were loud care stereos and problems with improper use of dumpsters. The committee plans to contact Solid Waste Services and Code Enforcement to work on a possible strategy.

Zoning, Dan Loring

There is little interest in zoning issues. There have been a few new zoning applications and few people attending the committee meetings. Title 21 is being rewritten. Dan Coffey and Debbie Ossiander meet every Wednesday to go A resolution relating to the fiscal impacts assoover the draft report. Mixed-use zoning would require all buildings in that zone to be mixeduse; this might create problems. The committee meets the first Wednesday of each month.

Sgt. Cindi Stanton, APD

This is her last meeting as she is returning to patrol duty. Prior to making her report, Sharon Chamard that Sgt. Stanton for her services to the Fairview Community. Sgt. Stanton will remain our point of contact until someone else fills the slot of community liaison officer. Dan Loring said that the neighborhood is having graffiti problems. Sgt Stanton encouraged the calling of Graffiti Busters. Dan commented on gang and social problems at Chester Park Estates, and asked if APD is tracking gang and graffiti in Fairview. Sgt. Stanton replied that the Gang Task Force works city-wide and not specifically in Fairview. Dan asked if we can have proactive police work to deal with gangs and graffiti. Sgt. shifts. There is a high dropout rate at the Police Academy and many officers retiring. Another question concerned cars parked on sidewalks. Sgt. Stanton said the best thing to do is to call APD dispatch with a description of the vehicle; Deposits Community Service Officers can respond.

Community Comments & Concerns:

Sharon Chamard reported that she has received a report from Kinney and Associates regarding the 16th Avenue Terrace Study. The FVCC copy was given to Allen Kemplen; other copies are available for viewing at the Anchorage Senior Center and the Fairview Community Recreation Center.

Dan Loring said when we had community policing in the past we had a very visible police force with connections to and knowledge of the neighborhood. Sharon Chamard said that community policing can take many forms. Many of the same police work in Fairview, and they do indeed know the neighborhood and the criminal element here, even if they are not always well-known to other residents. Cindi Stanton said that other neighborhoods have more problems than Fairview, and suggested that residents go on a ride-along with an APD officer. Also, community policing is in the strategic plan for APD when resources allow its implementation.

Education, Dale Myhill

There was no June committee meeting. The next meeting will be July 25th at 6 pm at the Gateway Learning Center at 801 Karluk Street. The committee is planning an Education Summit, which would involve the Fairview Community Council, Anchorage School District, Fairview Elementary School and others in the community. Fairview Recreation Center, Dave Brossard

Parks and Recreation is looking at the feasibility of resurrecting programs now defunct because of the closing of the Community Schools program. Things have been quiet at the Rec. Center; there is not much in the way of programs other than Alaska Basketball Development programs which run from 6-10 pm on weeknights and 1-6 pm on the weekends. Amy Danzl is leaving the Rec. Center. Her position will be filled in another month or so. The computer lab has been staffed by a volunteer from

Public Safety Committee, Sharon Chamard

The neighborhood has been relatively quiet. Problems with 1244 Hyder Street should soon be resolved. The owner has until mid-September to make improvements to the property or the city will seize it and demolish the building. There was a general discussion about gangs and whether crime is going up in Fairview. One member said he thinks the situation is a "train wreck waiting to happen." He said the community has to get involved because the police can't solve the problem themselves. A representative from the Mental Health Consumer Web said outreach to the street people is important, and we need to bring people back into the community and try to integrate them. Another member agreed, while adding that the street people need to understand that what they are doing in the community is not welcome.

Community Comments and Concerns:

Sharon Chamard reported that funds that benefit Fairview have been allocated in the recently-signed state capital budget: \$150,000 for the Fairview Recreation Center, \$65,000 for 13th and Gambell Improvements, \$50,000 for safety improvements to Fairbanks Park, \$5,000 for books and technology for Fairview Elementary

School, and \$3,200 for equipment for the Fairview Community Patrol.

Sharon Chamard reported on plans for the Block Party, scheduled for July 15th. The proclamation is ready, Marc Robinson will be singing the national anthem, the DJ and clown have been booked, the awards have been ordered, the folks from the American Legion will cook, the grill has been arranged, extra picnic tables will be delivered, and donations have been received (from First National Bank, Affordable Used Cars, Bill Webb, Barry's Baranof Lounge, Carrs Gambell, and VF Grace).

Sue Ann Hamilton Bailey commented on how dangerous it is for pedestrians at the Lake Otis and Tudor intersection. She suggested putting up "No right turn on red" signs.

CITY TARGETS GANG VIOLENCE

A citizen's group is recommending a number of strategies to help families which have been touched by gang or youth violence. The Community Youth Violence Gang Response Team released a report Friday with 10 recommendations, including finding alternatives for students who are expelled from school and more ways for young people to be involved in school, sports and church. The recommendations from the 11-member committee are part of Mayor Begich's anti-gang initiative launched in coordination with the Anchorage Police Department a year ago. Mayor Begich also met with several pastors and chiefs from the Polynesian community to talk about ways to stop gang violence in the city.
