MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER MEETING

Meeting called to order by President Darrel Hess at 7:06 pm.

Secretary's Report, Sharon Chamard:

There was no quorum, hence no vote to accept the previous meetings' minutes.

Treasurer's Report:

No report.

Fairview Elementary Report:

Dr. Marc Robinson introduced the Fairview Elementary School Student Council officers and the faculty advisor, Francisca Guilford. Upcoming events at the school include Sports Day on November 30th and a canned food drive from November 15th to December 15th. The food drive will serve families in Fairview. The annual winter music program, entitled "Paint the Town," is on December 5th at 7 pm.

Allan Tesche:

The Assembly passed the 2007 budget two weeks ago, which included about \$400 million for general government. Mill levies and tax rates are going down, largely because of state legislative funding of \$22 million in 2006 and another anticipated \$22 million in 2007.

The Assembly will consider an ethics code on November 14th.

There will be another one-hour meeting sponsored by AFACT at St. Anthony's Catholic Church on Klevin in Russian Jack on November 27th at 7 pm. This meeting will bring together Mayor Begich, Police Chief Heun and Anchorage School District Superintendent Comeau with the community for a discussion about youth and how to address the problems of youth. Sharon Chamard commented that she had attended simi-

lar AFACT meetings in the past and was impressed at how efficiently they are run. She asked about the outcomes of previous AFACT meetings. Pam Tesche replied that one notable outcome has been the creation of a free after-school Campfire program at Central Lutheran Church to serve the youth of west Fairview.

President's Report, Darrel Hess:

To cut down on e-mails sent out to people from the Federation of Community Councils, the Federation has adopted a new policy: notices and what-not will be posted to a central page which will be available for viewing by anyone, at anytime.

United Way recently announced that its 50th anniversary "Day of Caring" project will be held early next summer in Fairview. Fairbanks. Fairview, and Fairview Lions Parks will be project sites, as well as the Fairview Community Recreation Center and possibly the Anchorage Senior Center and Fairview Elementary School. The FVCC has obtained funds for Fairbanks Park from the Parks Foundation (\$35,000) and the state (\$50,000), and the municipality will put \$200,000 towards materials for the overall Fairviewwide project. Allan Tesche said that it means a lot that Fairview has been selected, and that we are very lucky, as this will be a defining project for the community.

People have been coming to the FVCC for about six years advocating a project to deal with consequences of the 15th Avenue rebuild. The median on that street makes it impossible for motorists coming south from Nelchina or Orca Streets to turn left; people must go to Medfra Street to the

stoplights. This excess traffic goes on 16th Avenue Terrace, although it is essentially an alleyway. The 16th Avenue Terrace project has been scoped and funds have been set aside. It may be delayed because one of the two houses that were slated for demolition to widen 16th Avenue Terrace is owned and occupied by a former teacher from Fairview Elementary who has cancer. The municipality wants to be sure to take care of her needs.

The 13th and Gambell project will go ahead in spring 2007. There have been some delays because of right-of-way acquisition. Some aspects of the development will occur because of the parameters of the Highway Safety Improvement Project--V.F. Grace will lose the use of its parking lot on the north-west corner of the intersection, and the Carrs/Safeway sign will be moved and replaced (because of the new municipal sign ordinance). None of this will be charged to the community.

At the Assembly on November 14th, two issues of importance to Fairview are on the agenda: a resolution posthumously recognizing Helen Mason for her contributions to the Fairview community, and a \$220,000 contract with Kinney Engineering for the 16th Avenue Terrace project.

The Mayor's Homeless Plan calls for a respite center for the homeless. A possible venue was the Mental Health Consumer Web's Computer Connection location at 13th and Gambell. Darrel Hess, who is a member of the Housing and Neighborhood Development Commission, argued that this location is inappropriate because of its proximity to two liquor stores
